VTCT Level 2 Diploma in Hairdressing

WHY SHOULD I CHOOSE THIS STUDY PROGRAMME?

The VTCT Level 2 Diploma in Ladies Hairdressing is a Technical Qualification aimed at students aged 16-19 who require a full-time Level 2 education programme and wish to pursue a career as an employed and/or self-employed junior hairdresser/hairstylist. There are no formal entry requirements for this qualification; however a student will ideally hold a Level 1 qualification or equivalent in hairdressing.

Students who complete this qualification are eligible to become a graduate State Registered Hairdresser (SRH) with The Hairdressing Council. This qualification has been developed collaboratively with employers, professional associations and key stakeholders in the hairdressing sector. The knowledge, skills and competencies gained will provide the best possible opportunity for progression into employment.

WHAT WILL I STUDY?

This qualification is based on the national occupational standards for hairdressing and includes all the required elements to work effectively as a junior hairdresser/hairstylist.

All mandatory units must be passed, which include :

- Advise and consult with clients
- Blow-dry and style hair
- Colour and lighten hair
- Cut ladies hair
- Health, safety and hygiene
- Set and dress hair
- Shampoo, condition and treat the hair and scalp
- Style hair with electrical equipment

Throughout this qualification, students will develop their knowledge and understanding of relevant anatomy and physiology. Students will acquire knowledge of all relevant testing together with health, safety and legislation requirements necessary for a junior hairdresser/hairstylist. They will also develop the knowledge, understanding and skills to consult with clients, provide a range of basic cutting, colouring and lightening services. Alongside these are units to develop skills in setting, dressing, blow-drying and styling hair with electrical equipment.

In parallel, students will develop their communication and customer service skills, their awareness of environmental sustainability and their commercial skills, all of which are valued highly by employers. Problem solving and research skills will also be developed.

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WHAT COULD THIS QUALIFICATION LEAD TO?

As a junior hairdresser/hairstylist, students could progress directly into employment in a variety of contexts, which include:

- Commercial hair salon
- Independent/self-employed/mobile/home-based settings
- Product manufacturing and training
- Television, film, theatre and media
- Armed services
- HM prison service
- Cruise liners

Whilst the primary purpose of this qualification is to prepare students for employment, students may choose to develop their knowledge and skills further by completing a specialist qualification at Level 3, in one of more of the following areas:

- Senior stylist
- Salon management
- Hair colour correction
- Specialist hair and scalp services

WHAT WILL BE EXPECTED OF ME?

- A professional attitude
- Professional appearance at all times
- Appreciation of a working environment
- Punctual and reliable with your attendance as you will be working with the general public
- Plan your service portfolio with your teacher taking a holistic view to your development
- Keep your service portfolio up to date and presented to a high standard
- Keep a record of your progress and formative feedback
- Talk to your teachers about your ideas and how to achieve the best results
- Present your work in a suitable format according to the purpose and the audience
- Evaluate your work and make suggestions for improvement
- Meet deadlines
- Keep a record of the work you have completed, including the grades and points you have been awarded

WHO WILL BE INVOLVED?

- The subject teachers and assessors are responsible for planning lessons, preparing resources, assessing work and making sure that the units are completed on time.
- Internal assessments will be graded by your teacher/assessor and these assessments checked by the IQA (Internal Quality Assurer) and externally quality assured by VTCT.
- External examinations will be marked by VTCT.



FURTHER INFORMATION

How will you be assessed?

Students must complete the assessment requirements below for mandatory units:

Service Portfolio

Students must produce a formative service portfolio that includes evidence of practical service carried out with proficiency. Whilst the pre-requisite portfolio does not contribute to the qualification grade, it serves as a valuable 'assessment for learning' tool to prepare students for summative assessments.

Graded Practical Assessment

Graded practical assessment must take place in a real or realistic working environment. This accounts for 50% of the overall qualification grade.

External Examinations

External examinations will test knowledge and understanding from across the whole vocational area of the mandatory units. They are set and marked by VTCT and will contribute to the overall qualification grade. This accounts for 30% of the overall qualification grade.

Graded Synoptic Assessment

Students will be required to undertake a graded synoptic assessment during which they will carry out a range of services from across all the mandatory units. Assessment coverage may vary each year and all services will be covered over time. VTCT will set the brief and grading descriptors, although the assessment will be marked and graded by centre staff and externally quality assured by VTCT. The graded synoptic assessment will contribute to the overall grade of the qualification. This accounts for 20% of the overall qualification grade.

The external examinations and the graded synoptic assessment should be carried out in the final third of the learner's completion period of learning. Each mandatory unit will attract an overall grade of either Pass, Merit or Distinction.
